Exceptional tropical forest birding with large numbers of endemics in one of the world's least known and exotic birding destinations. We will explore areas of lowland, hill, and montane forest teeming with birdlife. We expect to see a large variety of birds-of-paradise, fabulous kingfishers, pigeons, parrots, bowerbirds, and many handsome forest skulkers. West Papua is the jewel in the crown of Indonesia's eastern archipelago. Here, large tracts of lowland rainforest remain, and the isolated highlands of the Arfak Mountains are home to a bounty of wonderful birds-of-paradise. Close to the mainland, the well-serviced islands of Waigeo and Biak are teeming with tantalizing endemics set against a backdrop of coastal forests and tropical seas home to some of the world's best coral reefs. This tour complements our already popular offering to Papua New Guinea by focusing on the specialties of the Vogelkop "Bird's Head" Peninsula, where we'll access several fantastic birding locales in a concise time frame, with minimal travel days.

Our exploration will begin on the small but endemic-rich island of Biak before we cross to the mainland and venture up to a homestay in the famous Arfak Mountains for several nights. Here there are multiple established hides and stakeouts for an array of mindblowing species. We have the chance to watch male Western Parotia, Vogelkop Lophorina, and even Black Sicklebill perform displays that epitomize the extremes of sexual selection in birds. Here also, the Vogelkop Bowerbird constructs his bower, or "maypole," and displays his assorted collections of items taken from the forest; it is truly a bucket list experience. After our time in the highlands, we will return to the birdy lowlands near Sorong before a ferry trip out to wonderful Waigeo, where the mesmerizing display of Wilson's Bird-of-Paradise will be front of mind. In addition to the fantastic birds-of-paradise on offer, West Papua is home to a huge variety of specialties and families unique to the Papuan landmass. Owlet-nightjars, imperial pigeons, tiger-parrots, melampitta, jewel-babblers, paradise-kingfishers, monarchs, peltops, boatbills, and many more exotic species are all possible.

For this journey to the eastern end of the Indonesian archipelago, we will be joined by an experienced and capable local guide and crew who will ensure our trip is as comfortable and smooth as possible. We will stay in good hotels and one excellent resort for most of this tour, however our time in the Arfaks will be spent at a very basic homestay with shared facilities. Travel will be via minibus and four-wheel drives, with mostly short drives, and a return ferry trip on a "fast boat" which adds the bonus of some pelagic birding. This is sure to be a great adventure to one of the last remaining areas of wilderness in South-East Asia.



June 21-23, Days 1-3: Travel to Jakarta; Flight to Makassar. Participants should arrange to depart the USA on or before June 21, cross the International Date Line and arrive in Jakarta no later than the early morning of June 23. Upon arrival at Jakarta's Soekarno-Hatta International Airport (JKT) and clearing customs, please make your way through the airport to terminal 1A for Sriwijaya Air flight SJ-580, currently scheduled to depart at 2:00 pm, arriving at Makassar's Sultan Hasanuddin International Airport at 5:25 pm – a total of 2 hrs and 25 mins actual flying time.

Participants wanting to avoid the risk of misconnecting should consider arriving in Jakarta on or before June 21 and spend the night. Upon request, VENT will be happy to assist with any additional lodging arrangements.

Upon arrival in Makassar we will be transferred to our comfortable and conveniently located lodging at the HARPER Perintis Makassar Hotel, just a short drive from the airport. Makassar is largest city of Eastern Indonesia located on the south-east coast of Sulawesi. Unfortunately, there won't be much time to explore Makassar. There will be dinner and the opportunity to meet your guides and some (brief) introductions before retiring in preparation for an early start the following day.

NIGHTS (June 21 & 22): In transit to Jakarta NIGHT (June 23): HARPER Perintis Makassar Hotel, Makassar

June 24, Day 4: Fly to Biak. We have a very early flight to Biak this morning. There are limited alternative options in this regard and our departure from Makassar at 3:15 am will be challenging! The three-hour flight, thankfully, will be an opportunity to catch up on some rest. Assuming there are no delays, we should arrive at Biak Island just after 7:00 am. First up checking in to our accommodation at the Swiss-Belhotel, a relatively modern and stylish facility – certainly the best that Biak has to offer! There will be time to freshen up, enjoy some breakfast and prepare for our first day of birding.

Biak is a low-lying, coral fringed island located within Cavendish Bay around 60 miles off the north-west coast of West Papua. It is in fact a wonderful place to begin our West Papuan journey given this is the most populous and developed of the Geelvink archipelago, allowing us to explore the island in some comfort. It also (importantly) hosts an impressive array of endemics and a bunch of quality extras. This will be our first encounter with some of the distinctive Australasian bird families. Megapodes, pigeons, old-world parrots, trillers, whistlers and Australasian warblers are well represented with several stand-out endemics. The stunning Biak Paradise-Kingfisher, Geelvink Fruit-Dove, and the recently split Biak Hooded Pitta are high on the target list of any visiting birder.

We will focus our efforts on the more easily accessed forest sites today including some roadside birding and forest trails. Despite extensive and ongoing clearing of forest for agriculture most of the local specialist birds are reasonably widespread. Others, such as the Biak Monarch, Biak Coucal and the Biak Scops Owl will require some luck and special effort.

June 25, Day 5: Biak. Some of the targets (all endemics) will include Biak Megapode, Geelvink Imperial-Pigeon, Black-winged Lory, Biak Whistler, Biak Monarch, Biak Leaf Warbler, Biak Gerygone, Biak White-eye and Long-tailed Starling. All of these are quite plausible. Biak Paradise-Kingfisher are reasonably common, and the Geelvink Fruit-Dove is also likely but getting decent views of Biak Hooded Pitta can be a challenge. With a supporting cast on Biak that includes Claret-breasted Fruit-Dove, Moustached Treewswift, Emperor Fairywren and Golden Monarch, it is certain to be an exciting day of island birding.

NIGHT: Swiss-Belhotel Cendrawasih, Biak

June 26, Day 6: Fly Biak to Maokwari; Drive to Arfak Mountains. After breakfast we will fly from Biak to the regional capital of Manokwari (via Jayapura). Upon arrival in Manokwari we will have lunch and purchase supplies in preparation for our stay in the Arfak Mountains.

The Arfak Mountain Range situated on the Birds Head or (the Dutch) 'Vogelkop' Peninsula is a distinctive geographical formation in the far north-west of West Papua that somewhat resembles a bird head. The range itself rises steeply and dramatically from the north coast to its highest point – Mount Arfak at a regionally impressive 9,700 feet. Being densely forested and effectively isolated from the central range of the New Guinea Highlands to the east, this montane system supports an exceptional array of endemics and forms part of the Vogelkop montane rainforests ecoregion.

It is a two to three-hour drive from Manokwari to the Minggre Birdwatching Homestay – our base for the next three nights. To be clear, the facilities here (and throughout the Arfaks) are basic, simple but comfortable homestay-style accommodation. We will compromise on some of the mod-cons (no WiFi or air-conditioning, and unreliable hot water) for this three-night/four-day period, for the opportunity to observe some of the most extraordinary birds on the planet in a wild and largely undeveloped and unspoiled landscape. The Arfak Mountains are arguably West Papua's premier birdwatching destination.

NIGHT: Kimiyeit Home Stay, Arfaks

June 27-28, Days 7-8: Arfak Mountains. Mid-elevation site ideally situated to explore the various highland forest communities which include tropical mountain rainforest, lower mountain forest and foothill forest. A superbly diverse ecosystem that harbors some of the world's great avian treasures. Much of the birding will be along level dirt roads and tracks, however, there may be some trickier tracks involving steep and slippery sections to reach some of the less-obtrusive species – of course these forays are always optional.

This is bucket-list territory. We will dedicate time to targeting several Bird-of-Paradise species here, four of which are considered 'Vogelkop endemics. Each species has its own distinctive display and having the chance to witness their intricate and diverse courtship rituals will be an unforgettable experience. From the surreal electro-ballet of the Western Parotia to the dramatic kabuki-like performance of the Vogelkop Lophorina – both famously captured on David Attenborough's series 'Our Planet', this is nature at its absolute finest. There is also the possibility of Arfak Astrapia and the rare and poorly known Long-tailed Paradigalla, both unique to the Arfaks. In addition, Magnificent and Lesser birds-of-paradise, the incredible Black Sicklebill, Magnificent Riflebird, and Glossymantled Manucode feature amongst the other 'Paradiseaids' in range. Another fascinating resident is the Vogelkop Bowerbird, regarded as the world's greatest avian architect. The male of this species

constructs an incredible roofed 'maypole' bower decorated with beautifully organized collections of colorful berries, beetle-wings, and flowers to impress the females – each bower is different.

The list of forest gems we may record is extensive. Some of a dizzying array of regulars to the Minggre region include the following; Sultan's and Black-billed cuckoo-doves, Cinnamon Ground-Dove, Ornate, Superb, and White-breasted fruit-doves, Papuan Mountain-Pigeon, Rufous-throated and White-eared bronze-cuckoos, several of the remarkable owlet-nightjars like Feline, Mountain, and Vogelkop; Mountain Swiftlet, White-striped Forest Rail, Long-tailed Honey-buzzard, Pygmy Eagle, Black-mantled Goshawk, Papuan Boobook, Blyth's Hornbill, Red-breasted Pygmy-Parrot, Bluecollared Parrot, Fairy and West Papuan lorikeets, Arfak Catbird, Masked Bowerbird, Papuan Treecreeper, Wallace's and White-shouldered fairwrens, Ornate and Vogelkop melidectes, Mountain, Arfak, and Long-billed honeyeaters, Red, Papuan Black, Elfin, and Red-collared myzomelas, Goldenface, Mountain and Rusty mouse-warblers, Large, Vogelkop, and Grey-green scrubwrens, Gray Thornbill, Brown-breasted Gerygone, Spotted and Chestnut-backed jewelbabblers, Black-bellied Cicadabird, Rufous-naped Bellbird, Black Pitohui, Vogelkop and Sclater's whistlers, Hooded Pitohui, Black-breasted Boatbill, the curious monotypic Mottled Berryhunter, Drongo, Black, Friendly, and Chestnut-bellied fantails, Fan-tailed Monarch, Lesser Melampitta, Gray Crow, Mid-mountain Berrypecker, Spectacled Longbill, an amazing array of Australasian robins like Green-backed, Garnet, Arfak, Black-throated, Blue-gray, White-faced, and Lesser Ground-Robin; Island Leaf Warbler, Black-fronted and Capped white-eyes, and the tiny Olive-crowned Flowerpecker. Keeping in mind that rainforest birding is difficult and most of these are elusive and skulking varieties that reveal themselves infrequently.

During our stay we will be relying on local guides with their exceptional bush skills and knowledge of the area and behavior of these birds (in particular, the birds-of-paradise) to maximize our chance of

an encounter. Visiting known lekking sites, hides and feed tables will enhance opportunities for observation, and often at very close range.

NIGHTS: Kimiyeit Home Stay, Arfaks

June 29, Day 9: Arfak Mountains; Drive to Manokwari. We will have a final morning of birding in the Arfaks before descending to the humid lowlands and relative civilization of Manokwari. We can look forward to an evening at a quality establishment with all the modern amenities (including of course hot showers!) and some fine dining – a well-deserved reward after some surely memorable birding in the highlands of West Papua.

NIGHT: Swiss-Belhotel, Manokwari

June 30, Day 10: Fly to Sorong. Today we have a morning flight to the city of Sorong on the far western tip of the Vogelkop Peninsula – the largest and most developed city in West Papua, and capital of the Southwest Papuan Province. After lunch we will check into our hotel and have the afternoon to bird an area of mangrove and swamp forest south of the city. A colorful boardwalk and a viewing tower will enable some access. Importantly this is a hotspot for the rare Blue-black Kingfisher, a beautiful and range restricted species.

Other species we may encounter here include Spotted Whistling-Duck, Orange-fronted Fruit-Dove, Collared Imperial-Pigeon, Lesser Black Coucal, Little Bronze-Cuckoo, Glossy and Uniform swiftlets, Moustached Treeswift, Barred Rail, Nankeen Night-Heron, Striated Heron, Little Kingfisher, Bluefronted Fig-Parrot, Red-flanked Lorikeet, Emperor Fairywren, Helmeted Friarbird, Large-billed Gerygone, Black Butcherbird, the reclusive Black Thicket-Fantail, and Shining Flycatcher.

NIGHT: Aston Sorong Hotel & Conference Center, Sorong

July 1, Day 11: Malasigi. Today we have an early morning drive to Malasigi, a traditional Papuan village and pristine tract of lowland rainforest around 30 miles east of Sorong. It is home to the Moi people and serves as an eco-tourist venture that offers traditional cultural experiences and access to the surrounding forests, rivers, and cave systems. We have a full day to explore this relatively newly opened and under-birded region, targeting some of the specialized lowland forest species including the exquisite King Bird-of-Paradise and Lesser Bird-of-Paradise. Several others, such as Twelve-wired Bird-of-Paradise are also known from this location but it will depend on the time of day, location and knowledge of active lekking sites. A few of the other possibilities include the endemic Red-billed Brushturkey, lovely Rufous-bellied Kookaburra, sneaky Hook-billed Kingfisher, Mimic Honeyeater, Tawny Straightbill, Papuan Babbler, Rusty Pitohui, Hooded Monarch, Spot-winged Monarch, Gray Crow, Yellow-faced Myna, and likely many others.

NIGHT: Aston Sorong Hotel & Conference Center, Sorong

July 2, Day 12: Ferry to Waigeo. After breakfast this morning we will transfer to Sorong Harbor for the 9:00 am ferry which traverses the Dampier Strait and arrives in Waisai on the island of Waigeo around midday. The boat trip itself can be productive, and we will keep an eye out for any seabirds such as tropical terns, shearwaters, frigatebirds, and boobies. Matsudaira's Storm-Petrel and Bulwer's Petrel are also possibilities at this time of year as well as several species of cetaceans.

Waigeo is the largest island within the Raja Ampat archipelago – a popular tourist destination (especially for diving enthusiasts) featuring some of the most biologically diverse marine ecosystems on the planet. The densely forested mountainous interior also hosts some spectacular wildlife including two endemic birds-of-paradise. The astonishing Wilson's Bird-of-Paradise, rated by many as one of the world's best birds, is a key target, as is the Red Bird-of-Paradise (another stunning endemic). A series of accessible hides provide excellent opportunities to observe both these species.

We shall check in to our lovely accommodation at the Korpak Resort before a casual afternoon with the options to relax or bird around the villa itself. Spice, Pinon's and Pied imperial-pigeons are regular, Lesser Frigatebird, Blyth's Hornbill, Beach Kingfisher are also on the list, and Papuan Eclectus is refreshingly common. Mimic Honeyeater, Helmeted Friarbird, and Brown-headed Crow are others worth looking out for around our lodgings.

NIGHT: Korpak Villa and Resort, Waigeo

July 3-4, Days 13-14: Waigeo. Whilst most visitors to Raja Ampat head to the beaches and diving sites, we should have the forest to ourselves and over the next two days will have several opportunities to search for the island's star attractions. Wilsons Bird-of-Paradise will be a priority. Variously described as the best or most beautiful bird in the world, it is certainly one of the strangest – the adult male presenting a combination of electric blue cap, deep red and black mantle, and curiously curled, antennae-like tail plumes. We have a very good chance to observe the bizarre courtship ritual at eye-level, from the comfort of a specially constructed hide. We will also try our luck at the 'dancing tree' of the Red Bird-of-Paradise and visit some different forest areas that should

produce a nice variety of other birds. Two other endemics we hope to encounter are the recently split Waigeo Shrikethrush and Waigeo Pitohui. Another endemic we are less likely to record is the near mythical Waigeo Brushturkey, a species thought to be extinct until it was rediscovered in 2002 after disappearing for 120 years. There is now a small population confined to remote montane forest on Mount Danai in east Waigeo.

Some of the more realistic possibilities include Dusky Megapode, Beautiful and Claret-breasted fruit-doves, Pinon's Imperial Pigeon, Blyth's Hornbill, Rufous-bellied Kookaburra, Hook-billed, Yellow-billed, and Common Paradise kingfishers, Papuan Eclectus, Red-cheeked Parrot, South Papuan Pitta, Puff-backed, Mimic, Tawny-breasted, and Spotted honeyeaters, Rusty Mouse-Warbler, Green-backed Gerygone, Brown Oriole, Glossy-mantled Manucode, the gorgeous Golden and Frilled monarch, Black-sided Robin, Yellow-faced Myna, and Olive-crowned Flowerpecker.

A nocturnal spotlighting search is recommended for both Papuan Frogmouth and Papuan Boobook. There is also a chance to observe the Waigeo Cuscus, a beautifully patterned endemic marsupial still reasonably common in the village and surrounds.

This promises to be a relaxing and hopefully very productive conclusion to the tour. A wealth of fascinating birds and wildlife on the most idyllic island paradise imaginable. Enjoying, along with the birds, some fabulous dining and great sunsets from the comfort of this very well-appointed luxury beachside resort.

NIGHTS: Korpak Villa and Resort, Waigeo

July 5, Day 15: Ferry to Sorong. This morning, we can have one final birding session on Waigeo before returning to Sorong at midday by ferry. There may also be an optional afternoon bird walk at the nearby mangrove forest in Sorong (if time allows). Tonight, we will have a final farewell dinner and relive a very memorable two weeks in this beautiful and remote part of Indonesia.

NIGHT: Aston Sorong Hotel & Conference Center, Sorong

July 6, Day 16: International departures. Tour ends this morning with departures from Sorong.

Essential Tour Information

TOUR SIZE: This tour will be limited to 8 participants.

TOUR LEADER: Scott Baker with the assistance of a local guide.



Scott Baker's interest in wildlife began early on while growing up in the leafy, outer eastern suburbs of Melbourne which, although a highly urbanized environment, retained significant tracts of remnant natural woodland. It was here at the age of 11 that he got his first pair of binoculars and began what was to become a lifetime quest to identify all the birds in an ever-expanding neighborhood. By the age of 15 he was running weekly bird walks and talks and became a founding member of the very successful Yarran Dheran Junior Field Naturalists Club. In 1988 he was named the Nunawading Young Citizen of the Year in recognition of his contribution to natural history and conservation. Pursuing mutual interests in life science and fine art, Scott went on to hold various roles

in business, education, and environmental consultancy. This has facilitated opportunities to explore the wild places and wildlife of Australia and beyond. In 30 plus years he has traveled extensively throughout the continent with a major focus on birds. He loves the rare and sometimes challenging, cryptic varieties but also shorebirds and seabirds, having spent many days at sea. To date he has recorded (and photographed) almost all of the regular and resident land birds and pelagic species likely in the country. Scott has a passion for wildlife, not just birds, and conducts studies and regular surveys for mammals, reptiles, and frogs. His fieldwork will often involve additional nocturnal spotlighting sessions, requiring late nights and early mornings to maximize the "tetrapod" options, when possible. Scott is a well-regarded member of the Australian birding community, a moderator on several birdwatching forums and rare bird committees, and, since 2017, has run birdwatching and nature tours within Australia and parts of southeast Asia. He currently resides in Victoria but frequently interstate or abroad.

TOUR COSTS & PAYMENT INFORMATION:

TOUR FEE: : \$ 13,525 per person based on double occupancy. This includes all meals from dinner on Day 3 through dinner on Day 15, accommodations as stated in the itinerary, all ground transportation during the tour, and guide services provided by the tour leaders. It does **not** include airfare to nor from the starting/ending city; however, flights within the tour (if any) are included. The fee also excludes alcoholic beverages, laundry, personal expenses, and other items of a personal nature. For information about gratuities, please see the "TIPPING" subsection below. If the minimum group size is not met, each participant will be charged a small-group supplement—shared equally and communicated in advance—to allow the tour to proceed.

SINGLE SUPPLEMENT: If you request single accommodations, a single supplement of **\$525** will be added to your tour fee.

When comparing trip costs with other tour companies, please consider that our tour fees include the flights between Jakarta and West Papua, and all internal air within West Papua. This represents a considerable savings as it includes several flights and a good deal of additional expense if you were to pay it separately.

REGISTRATION & DEPOSIT: You may register for this tour through the VENT <u>website</u> or by calling our office (512-328-5221). The initial deposit for this tour is **\$1,000** per person. A second deposit of **\$3,000** is due 210 days prior to departure (November 23, 2025). We accept MasterCard and Visa for both deposits. If you choose not to register online, you may pay your deposit by credit card, check, money order, or bank transfer. If not paying online, or by card, your tour space will be held for 10 days pending receipt of your deposit..

PAYMENTS: All tour payments may be made by credit card (MasterCard or Visa), check, money order, or bank transfer (contact the VENT office for bank transfer information). These include initial deposits, second deposits, interim payments, final balances, special arrangements, etc. Full payment of the tour fee is due 150 days January 22, 2026) prior to the tour departure date.

EXTRA ARRANGEMENTS: Should you wish to make arrangements to arrive early or extend your stay, please contact the VENT office at least two months prior to your departure date. We can very easily make hotel arrangements and often at our group rate, if we receive your request with enough advance time.

EXCHANGE RATE SURCHARGES: Tour prices are based on the rate of exchange at the time of itinerary publication. If rates change drastically, it may be necessary to impose a surcharge. If a surcharge is necessary, every effort will be made to minimize the amount. In many cases, these additional foreign exchange rate surcharges have been passed on to VENT by its vendors and suppliers.

FUEL SURCHARGES: Our prices are based on fuel prices at the time of itinerary publication. While we will do everything possible to maintain our prices, it may be necessary to institute a fuel surcharge.

TIPPING: An important part of the value of a VENT tour is knowing that tips for local service providers at our destinations—restaurant staff, hotel staff, drivers, local guides, and various

other support staff—are included in your tour fee. If you would like to offer any of your local guides an additional tip, \$5 to \$10 a day is a common amount.

Tips for your VENT tour leader(s) are **not** included, but it is customary to tip one or both if you feel that you have received exceptional service. To assist in your planning, we recommend tipping your VENT tour leader(s) \$15 to \$20 per day, or the equivalent of approximately 2–4% of the tour fee.

If you plan to give tips by cash, they should be given directly to your tour leader at the end of the tour and **not** sent to the VENT office. Some of our tour leaders use mobile payment applications such as Venmo, PayPal, and Wise. If you would like to use this method, please ask your tour leaders directly whether they can accept tips through such an application.

We emphasize that tipping is optional and that these amounts are only recommendations. The amount you decide to tip is based entirely on your experience and at your discretion.

CANCELLATION & REFUNDS

CANCELLATION BY PARTICIPANT: Refunds, if any, for any cancellation by a participant are made according to the following schedule: If participant cancels 210 days or more before the tour departure date, a cancellation fee of \$500 per person will be charged unless the deposit is transferred to a new registration for another VENT tour that will operate within the next 12 months from the date of participant tour cancellation, in which case the cancellation fee will be \$100 per person. If cancellation is made between 209 and 151 days before departure date, the deposit is not refundable, but any payments covering the balance of the tour fee will be refunded. If cancellation is made fewer than 150 days before departure date, no refund is available. For participants' protection, we strongly recommend the purchase of travel insurance that covers trip cancellation/interruption.

*Unless the deposit is transferred to a new registration for another VENT tour that will operate within the next 12 months from the date of participant tour cancellation, in which case the cancellation fee will be \$100 per person. To qualify, cancellation must occur 180 days or more before departure date; deposit transfers must be made at the time of cancellation; and one transfer per deposit.

CANCELLATION BY VENT: If VENT cancels a tour prior to departure without cause or good reason, VENT will provide the participant a full refund, which will constitute full settlement to the participant.

If VENT cancels or delays a tour or any portion of a tour as a result of any Force Majeure event, VENT will use its reasonable best efforts to refund any payments on the balance of the tour fee to participant; provided that, VENT will have no obligation to provide a participant with a refund

and will not be liable or responsible to a participant, nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached any applicable agreement, for any failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any term of such agreement. A "Force Majeure" event means any act beyond VENT's control, including, without limitation, the following: (a) acts of God; (b) flood, fire, earthquake, hurricane, epidemic, pandemic or explosion; (c) war, invasion, hostilities (whether war is declared or not), terrorist threats or acts, riot or other civil unrest; (d) government order, law or actions; (e) embargoes or blockades; (f) national or regional emergency; (g) strikes, labor stoppages, labor slowdowns or other industrial disturbances; (h) shortage of adequate power or transportation facilities; and (i) any other similar events or circumstances beyond the control of VENT.

This VENT Cancellation & Refunds policy does not apply to air tickets purchased through VENT or to any special arrangements, such as additional hotel nights, that fall outside of the services described in the tour itinerary.

SUGGESTED OPTIONS: To safeguard against losses due to illness, accident, or other unforeseen circumstances, we strongly recommend the purchase of travel insurance as soon as possible after making a deposit. Through Redpoint, we recommend its comprehensive Ripcord plan, which includes a medical evacuation benefit. With this in mind, it is important to note that medical evacuation is not offered by Redpoint as a stand-alone policy or benefit. For travelers not interested in comprehensive travel insurance, VENT recommends Medjet and its MedjetAssist® plan. Medjet is not an insurance company, and Medjet Assist is not an insurance product; rather, Medjet is a membership-based air-medical transport company specializing in moving hospitalized travelers from an admitting hospital to a medical facility of choice. Medjet does not provide medical evacuation service from the point of injury or illness; yet, the MedjetAssist plan offers robust enough travel protection to satisfy the medical evacuation insurance requirement in place for many VENT tours.

AIR TRAVEL: Victor Emanuel Travel is a full-service travel agency and wholly owned subsidiary of Victor Emanuel Nature Tours (VENT). Victor Emanuel Travel will be happy to make any domestic or international air travel arrangements from your home and return. Per person fees apply for each set of travel arrangements: \$50 domestic; \$75 international.* Many of our travelers choose to make their own air travel arrangements, but we emphasize the benefits to using our services. If you book your air arrangements yourself, Victor Emanuel Travel is unable to provide support in managing any flight delays and/or cancellations that could occur before

and during a tour. When you purchase air tickets through Victor Emanuel Travel, our staff has ready access to your air ticket record and can provide assistance as problems arise. Please feel free to call the VENT office to confirm your air arrangements. Please be sure to check with the VENT office prior to purchasing your air ticket to confirm that the tour is sufficiently subscribed to operate. VENT cannot be held responsible for any air ticket penalties.

*An air ticket will be purchased by Victor Emanuel Travel on behalf of the traveler with the traveler's consent. A purchase is considered final upon receipt of payment. If a ticket is subsequently reissued at the behest of the traveler (i.e. voluntary change of plans), the same fee rates apply for the reissue process, in addition to any fees that may be charged by the airline.

BAGGAGE: Please limit baggage to one piece of luggage and one carry-on. The airlines now strictly enforce baggage regulations. Excess baggage charges, which can be substantial, are the personal responsibility of each participant. Please consult your pre-departure materials and/or airline to find out specific weight restrictions.

As a precaution against lost luggage, we suggest that you pack a change of clothes, toiletries, medications, important travel documents, optics, and any other essential items in your carry-on bag. Due to ever-changing circumstances in the government's attempts to improve airport security, we recommend that you check the website of the <u>Transportation Security Administration (TSA)</u> for information pertaining to permissible carry-on items.

TRAVEL DOCUMENTS: A passport valid for at least six months beyond your planned departure from Indonesia and a valid return airline ticket are required for United States citizens to enter Indonesia for up to 30 days. Longer stays will require a visa. Non-U.S. citizens should check with their consulate or embassy for instructions

WHAT TO BRING

CLOTHING: Lightweight field clothing is recommended for the lowlands, preferably in muted, drab colors, **NOT bright white, yellow or red.** Dark, muted colors help prevent startling the birds, especially when we are in the forests. This includes several pairs of pants and cool, comfortable shirts. Long-sleeved shirts, a hat, and sunglasses are recommended for protection from the sun and mosquitoes. Long socks are very useful, so that you can tuck your pants in and further avoid biting insects. A warm sweater, warm hat and thin gloves are <u>essential</u> for the highlands. **Raingear and an umbrella** are also essential, including waterproof pants which are very useful in case we encounter rain while in a boat. Dress will be casual.

Although there will be few, if any, rigorous walks, we may encounter some mud, slippery surfaces, uphill and uneven terrain and tree roots. Add to that the fact that you are on your feet for much of the day and it is **most important** that you provide suitable protection and support for your feet and ankles. Lightweight (Gore-Tex or some similar material) but strong boots (hiking boots) that come up to the ankle and have a good lug-sole are ideal. Many people are apprehensive that these will be too heavy; this is not true. The protection, grip, and day-long comfort such boots afford is far superior to

the seemingly comfortable sneakers/training shoes. If you like using a walking stick you should always bring it along every day.

EQUIPMENT: Having the right equipment makes the travel experience more enjoyable.

You should pack a pair of binoculars that are in good condition, along with a belt or day pack (good for carrying books, sunscreen, camera, etc.). Your leader will have a spotting scope, but if you have a spotting scope and wish to bring it, please feel free to do so. We will be birding from roadsides or open trails for much of the time, and a scope can be very useful for seeing such treetop birds as the birds-of-paradise. Other items to bring include a flashlight or headlamp, camera, extra batteries, water bottle, alarm clock, handy wipes, wash cloth, insect repellent, towel and umbrella (the latter is very useful and should be always carried). You should also have a supply of personal medication such as aspirin, a good cortisone cream, etc. As a precaution, it is a good idea to pack your binoculars, a change of clothing, toiletry items, medications, and travel documents in your airline carry-on bag.

Binoculars: We strongly recommend you bring a pair of good binoculars of 8x32, 8x42, or 10x42 magnification. Please do not bring mini binoculars of any kind. Some people like them because they are small and lightweight; but they have an extremely small field of view and very poor light gathering power. You will find that 8x32 binoculars are compact and light enough.

Spotting Scopes: Your tour leaders will have scopes available for group use throughout the trip, but if you have one and wish to bring it, please feel free to do so.

DESTINATION INFORMATION & LOCAL CONDITIONS

CLIMATE & WEATHER: During the tour you will experience a wide range of temperatures and climate, from the 70s and high 80s in the lowlands (where it is also humid), to the 40s and 50s at higher elevations. We will almost certainly encounter some rain, possibly heavy.

CONDITIONS: This is not a particularly strenuous tour however, it should be noted that West Papua, and in particular many of the highland sites in the Arfak Range are characterized by steep and sometimes muddy terrain. A moderate level of fitness and good balance is recommended. For the most part we intend to stick to the established roads and trails and preference the gentler (downhill) options – where possible. Be aware the surface conditions can vary, and it is always possible we may encounter mud, slippery surfaces, and stony ground. We will be on our feet for most of the time we are birding in the mornings and afternoons, for this reason it is MOST IMPORTANT that you provide suitable protection and support for your feet and ankles. A collapsible portable seat and a walking stick can be useful in this regard.

ACCOMMODATIONS: Generally average to good, modern hotels for the great majority of the trip, including one resort-style hotel on Waigeo. The homestay accommodation at Minggre in the Arfak Mountains is <u>basic</u>. Participants will have private rooms, with suitable bedding and lighting, however bathroom facilities will be shared. Hot water and power are intermittent, but certainly available.

<u>CURRENCY</u>: Indonesian Rupiah (IDR); exchange facilities are available through trade banks and at all international airports. It is recommended to change any money at Jakarta or Makassar. Visa/MasterCard are the most widely accepted credit cards. <u>Our leaders typically change their money at the airport in Jakarta as it is time-consuming to do on the ground in West Papua</u>.

INTERNET ACCESS: Wi-Fi will be available at all hotels, except for the Kimiyeit Home Stay in the Arfaks. Local SIM cards are available at major airports, or for those with newer mobile phones, E-SIMs are the best way to access the internet readily overseas.

LANGUAGE: Bahasa Indonesia, Melanesian, Pidgin, English and various local languages.

TIME: 13 hours ahead of Eastern Standard Time

LAUNDRY: Laundry service available at all the main hotels on this tour, except for Kimiyeit Homestay in the Arfak Mountains.

PHOTOGRAPHY: As with anywhere in the tropics, especially inside the forest, photography, especially of birds, is never easy. However, there will be some very worthwhile opportunities when birding along roadsides or at any of the hides or feeders.

HEALTH & SAFETY

HEALTH: VENT follows Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommendations for standard travel precautions, which includes vaccination against a variety of preventable diseases. Among these so-called Routine Vaccinations are measles/mumps/rubella (MMR) vaccine, diphtheria/pertussis/tetanus (DPT) vaccine, poliovirus vaccine (boosters for adult travelers), and Varicella (Chickenpox). You should also be up-to-date with Hepatitis A and Hepatitis B vaccinations.

If you are taking personal medication, prescription or over-the-counter, be sure to bring an ample supply that will allow you to get through the tour safely. Please consult your physician as necessary. Remember to pack all medication in your carry-on baggage, preferably in original containers or packaging. As airline baggage restrictions can change without warning, please check with your airline for procedures for packing medication.

COVID-19: We continually emphasize that our number one priority is the health and safety of our customers and employees. Although VENT no longer maintains any of its COVID-era prevention protocols, we strongly recommend best practices for protecting yourself and your fellow travelers against COVID-19 illness. These measures include receiving the primary series vaccinations for those eligible, staying "Up to Date" with COVID-19 booster shots, wearing high filtration N-95 or KN-95 masks when in airports and on airplanes, and avoiding risky social settings in the lead-up to your tour. These recommendations are firmly rooted in CDC guidance for avoiding COVID-19.

SUN EXPOSURE: The sun's ultraviolet rays are dangerous under prolonged exposure (sometimes only a matter of minutes), even in winter and early spring. Anytime you are outdoors you will want to protect your skin, including your lips, eyes, nose, and ears. A severe sunburn is potentially very painful and will affect your level of enjoyment. Always protect yourself when outdoors and be sure to bring an ample supply of high SPF sunscreen and lip balm. We strongly recommend the use of ultra-violet blocking, polarized sunglasses.

INSECT REPELLENTS: There are insect repellents for the skin and an insect repellent used to treat clothing that should not be applied to the skin.

Insect repellents for the skin are commonly available in three forms:

- **DEET:** (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide): A chemical compound that is marketed under various brand names (OFF!*, Cutter™, Ultrathon™, etc.) and offered in a variety of formulations including sprays, lotions, time-release preparations, and disposable wipes. The formulations will state a percentage of the active ingredient DEET on the packaging. DEET may be applied to exposed skin directly and/or sprayed on clothing. Please be careful when applying DEET as it can damage plastics and lens coatings.
- **Picaridin:** A synthetic formulation that is derived from piperine, a substance found in plants that produce black pepper.
- **Herbal insect repellents:** Various mixtures of organic ingredients such as oils from eucalyptus, citronella, cedar, and other herbs. The herbal repellents are more difficult to categorize because of the difference in ingredients from one brand to another. There is considerable variation in their effectiveness.

Insect repellent for clothing is marketed in one approved formulation:

- Permanone® (Permethrin): is an odorless spray-on repellent that may be used for pretreatment of clothing, gear, and tents. It should not be used directly on the skin or sprayed on clothing while it is being worn. The pre-treatment process requires a number of hours to complete and must be done outdoors, so it is best completed in advance of travel. Do-it-yourself pre-treatment must be repeated more often than commercial treatment using Insect Shield® technology. It is available at various outdoor stores and can easily be found online.
- **Insect Shield** apparel: Clothing pre-treated with Permethrin is made by a variety of manufacturers. It is available for purchase from some sporting goods suppliers. The clothing is advertised as retaining its repellency for up to 70 washings.

The US EPA offers a search tool to help choose a repellent that is best for a particular situation. For example, some repellents work for mosquitoes, but not for ticks.

In addition to your physician, a good source of general health information for travelers is the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta Georgia. The CDC operates a 24-hour recorded Travelers' Information Line at 800-CDC-INFO (800-232-4636), or you can check their website at www.cdc.gov/travel. Canadian citizens should check the website of the Public Health Agency of Canada

A Note About Chiggers: This tour visits areas where chiggers are known to occur. Chiggers are tiny parasitic mites found in most warm weather areas of the southern United States and the world's tropics. They are especially numerous in grassy areas, where, in the immature stage, they attach themselves to other animals or humans who contact the grass as they pass by. Chiggers do not suck blood, and the majority of species do not carry disease. They do feed on bodily fluids through a process in which a digestive enzyme is produced by the chigger which essentially liquefies the skin around the area where the chigger is attached. The chigger is not usually attached to the skin for more than a few hours before it either falls off or is knocked off. Our bodies respond by producing a

hardened area as a defence against the chigger's digestive enzyme. Though the chigger may be long gone, it is the presence of the hardened area, and the body's natural process of reabsorbing it that typically causes intense itching, often lasting for a week or more. Chiggers like to attach themselves to areas of thin skin, like around the ankles, beltline, undergarment lines, knees, and elbows.

Chiggers can be avoided by following these procedures:

- Avoid walking or standing in areas dominated by grass. These areas are where one is most likely to encounter chiggers.
- Tuck your pants into your socks to avoid direct skin-to-grass contact. Chiggers can find their way through clothing, but this is a standard and effective prevention technique.
- Apply insect repellent to your skin and clothing. Please refer to the Insect Repellent section that follows for important information about selecting and applying repellent.
- Powdered sulfur applied to waist, bottoms of pants, sock and boots is also effective at repelling chiggers. However, be warned that clothes will retain the sulfur odor for several washings. If using sulfur, never touch your eyes, nose, or mouth before washing your hands first.
- Shower at the end of each day in the field. Use a washcloth to vigorously rub your legs, feet, and ankles.

By following these methods, you should be able to avoid all chigger bites, as well as tick bites. If, however, you are bitten by chiggers anyway, you can reduce or eliminate the symptoms by applying benzocaine or hydrocortisone creams, calamine lotion, After Bite, or any number of anti-itch products.

eBird: Among the largest and most successful citizen science projects in existence, eBird is an essential tool in promoting bird study and conservation. Among a range of benefits, eBird allows users to keep a variety of lists in a single application. When taxonomic splits are incorporated, lists are automatically updated. Additionally, trip leaders can share daily lists, so one only need accept a shared list and it will upload to your files! **Highly recommended.**

MERLIN BIRD ID: Merlin is an app designed as a birding coach for beginning and intermediate bird watchers. Excellent for use in the field, Merlin asks the observer a series of questions regarding his or her bird sighting, including date and location, and color, size, and behavior of a bird. Merlin then processes the viewer's responses to present a shortlist of possible identifications, from which the user can choose the likely bird. Species profiles include a brief physical description, photographs, and sound samples. The Photo ID feature allows anyone with a camera to snap a photo and obtain a list of suggestions. Merlin's Sound ID feature allows identification of birds through audible recognition. To use Merlin, download the app, followed by the appropriate regional "pack."
